

Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP) WAVES Visitor Records Release

This document, starting on the following page, is OSTP’s release of WAVES visitor records for March 2020. It is presented in alphabetical order by name of visitor, and then chronologically by appointment date and time.

Removed Records

In accordance with the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), records have been removed prior to producing this document in accordance with the following Freedom of Information Act exemptions:

- Pursuant to Exemption Three, OSTP removed 13 entries because the individuals satisfied the requirements of one of the following statutes: (1) 50 U.S.C. § 3507;¹ (2) 50 U.S.C. § 3024(m)(1);² (3) 10 U.S.C. § 424;³ and (4) 50 U.S.C. § 3605.⁴
- Pursuant to Exemption Six, OSTP removed 59 entries because the individuals were either: (1) minor children at the time of the visit; or (2) interviewing for a position that they did not receive.⁵

¹ Protecting “intelligence sources and methods” from public release when “the provisions of any other law . . . require the publication or disclosure of the organization, functions, names, official titles, salaries, or numbers of personnel employed by the [Central Intelligence] Agency.”

² Permitting the Director of National Intelligence to exempt from public release information respecting Agency personnel to the same extent as the Director of the Central Intelligence Agency under 50 U.S.C. § 3501.

³ Exempting from disclosure “the organization or any function of [the Defense Intelligence Agency; the National Reconnaissance Office; or the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency], or the number of persons employed by or assigned or detailed to any such organization or the name, official title, occupational series, grade, or salary of any such person.”

⁴ “Nothing in this Act or any other law . . . shall be construed to require the disclosure of the organization or any function of the National Security Agency, of any information with respect to the activities thereof, or the names, titles, salaries, or number of the persons employed by such Agency.”
